RECTOR

I am amazed to realise this is my seventh AMP in the parish. I am in humble awe at the activity and achievements of the Body of

Christ in this place and while mindful of the slow nature of progress in some areas, such as buildings, give thanks that we continue to grow and develop.

State of the Parish Strengths

2016 was a year of slow continued growth and development as a community of faith with the leadership group being broad and varied across the parish which is a sign of mature health. Our activity level remains astonishingly high both in the church and on behalf of the church within the community.

Vulnerabilities

It remains a vulnerability that so much is done by a relatively small group. Whenever one becomes ill or otherwise engaged we are all reminded how close to the limit we work. Although I suspect that will ever be the case as we just do more whenever we have the capacity!

Pastoral highlights

We continue to meet at least 4 times a week across the parish with Sunday services at St Leonard's and St Georges, and once a month Twilight Meditation on the Sunday evening, Wednesday's 11 am communion service, and Saturday at the Blue Wren Lodge. In 2016 we had 2 baptisms, 2 weddings, 6 funerals and 2 house blessings.

Liturgical

One of our main outreach activities is to provide worship opportunities for locals and visitors who are not regular church worshipers. Over the years we have a repertoire of such services including extras services at Christmas and Easter (numerically very successful this year), Pet Blessings, All Souls, songs of praise as part of the Festival of Voice, the Blessing of the Emergency Services Fleet in Walpole, and then those once off events.

It was wonderful to be able to mark the 60th anniversary of the Anglican Church having a built presence in Walpole during Bishop Allan's pastoral visit in May. This event was well attended by current and past members of the congregation and community.



Also as Alison has commented the events in October that brought people from the Art Trail into the church.

Study

Both Denmark and Walpole had Lent studies again this year. Many individuals also took books of personal devotions for the holy seasons of Advent and Lent. I am also aware that many people have a daily study pattern that they have developed over many years.

Mission

The single biggest mission of the church remains in many ways the Mustard Seed op shop and the



cheerful activity in the community and the good that we are able to contribute to with proceeds from the shop. During the year Jill Rule unfortunately needed to give up her role as Mission Secretary and Management Committee member, although she continues to be very involved in the Mustard Seed. Her creative passionate work is honoured. It was a delight to have Wendy Schwab join us on the committee and marks a fuller partnership with the community in this vital work.

In preparation for my leave and reduction in hours the financial assistance program is now administered by Community Resource Centre which is mainly working very well.

Building and Church Plant

2016 was a frustrating year in that a good deal of effort went into Expression of Interest to Lotterywest seeking a grant of \$347,000 (out of an estimated \$447,000 total cost) to support building an extension to the hall and renovating the existing hall. This was declined by Lotterywest on the basis that 1) Denmark has already had a great deal of money granted to other projects in recent years, 2) That Lotterywest will not fund building or fitting opportunity shops. While other smaller grants are still being sort after it is most likely that we will need to break the project down into smaller component parts and largely pay for the work ourselves.

With Lotterywest withdrawing from Heritage funding this is likely to be the case for future work in the church as well so from now on we need to be even more mindful of staying on top of maintenance issues so that we do not burden future generations with impossible bills.

General levels of maintenance and improvements have continued to be undertaken by parish council and St George's has been returned to a much higher standard of presentation and function over the last two years.

Diocesan perspectives

In November I had the honour of leading the ordination retreat for new deacon Rev'd Esther Leach of Living Waters and preaching at her ordination.

On a personal note

During the year I reduced my hours of work from 5.5 days to 3.5 days with Alison Kershaw working 2 days as a Stipended Licensed Lay Minister. This means the parish is still receiving the same amount of work but from two different people. This has been most welcome for me because of Alison's giftedness and also the reduction of

work for me. I also took the balance of my Long Service Leave during the year and I am so grateful that the whole leadership team, clergy and lay, stipended and non-stipended, were wonderful. The depth and breadth of people's commitment and skills in this community is part of the blessing of serving in this place which is now very much my home.

Safe Church

Sally Prickett continues to be the Safe Church Co-ordinator for the parish. Bishop Allan has stipulated that every church leader who has not already done so must attend a Safe Church Workshop in March or April this year, which will include all members of the new Parish Council.

Various safety issues systems have been put in place including what action should be taken if a medical incident occurs during a church service and indeed this system worked very well during an episode in January 2017. A Critical Incident Report File has been opened and there have been several reportable incidents all of which have been correctly reported and resolved. Safe Church is an Agenda item at each Parish Council meeting.

Mustard Seed Op Shop

Another highly financially successful year with 43 volunteers. Very much an outreach ministry based venture with approximately 75% of the volunteers being from within the community as opposed to being church members. Management Team consists of Rev. Sue, Jill Rule (who resigned in October 2016), Carol Mundell, Wendy Schwab (who joined the team on 21st October 2016) and Sally Prickett.

The Christmas lunch this year was at the RSL hall with many parishioners providing a scrumptious meal to the volunteers. Rev. Sue thanked the volunteers for their commitment and hard work and gave details of all the donations made through the year both locally, Australia wide and beyond.

Walpole Social Morning Tea

Thanks to Jean Lawrence for this initiative on the first Friday of each month since August 2016. Valued and supported by Walpole people.

Buildings & Property

A list of property expense is on page 4.

During February this year a sound system including a hearing aid loop was installed in St. Leonard's Church Denmark which has been most beneficial to parishioners attending services. The expense for this was incurred in 2015.

All parish buildings were checked by Swift Pest Management in the first quarter of the year. The only items to note was some old white ant activity near the front entrance of St. Leonard's and also several stumps under the church were suspected to be rotting. 12 white ant stations were installed around St. Leonard's in July on Parish Council's directive and these were checked at the end of October by the Warden and no white ant activity was found. The stumps were inspected and 3 were found to require replacing. This work will be done during 2017.

Coral McDonald resigned as an employed gardener for St. Leonard's Church during the year and we are grateful that Ken Richards, a parishioner, is kindly fulfilling this roll on a voluntary basis. Sam Mayers continues to maintain the church lawn at St. Leonard's and has been kept very busy with odd jobs for which we are very grateful.

The front retaining wall between the rectory and No. 7 Brazier Street has been replaced and during the coming year the same area between No.3. and the Rectory will also require being replaced.

In Conclusion

As you can see working together with parish and community members we have achieved many things in 2016. With confidence we look forward to 2017 being another year of achievements.

INDEPENDENT AUDIT REPORT

Scope

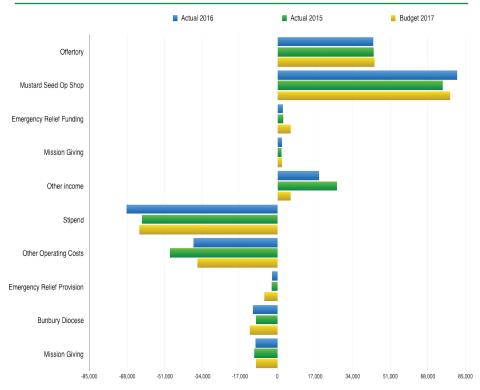

STIPENDIARY LAY MINISTER

Alison Kershaw

I commenced my position as stipendiary lay minister on 30th May after being blessed by Bishop Allan the day before. With Sue needing to reduce her hours, it was decided to extend my role as a lay minster in a two-days a week stipendiary position. While I continue to volunteer some of my time alongside others on parish council and in the team of licensed lay ministers, the stipendiary position has freed me to direct additional time and energy into parish life and building bridges into the community.

Pastoral

Meetings: Most weeks I meet with someone either within the parish, or on the fringe. There are many openhearted seekers in our community who appreciate the openness of our parish, and welcome invitations to special services, or the opportunity to ask questions.

Prayer Circle: I revised the process for updating and sharing information. The centralised list is not so overwhelming now, and we have held a number of people of prayer in recent months.

Community Outreach

Publicity: I promoted all the special events and services mentioned below in a variety of ways: posters, fliers, newspaper advertisements and feature stories, street banners, our website, and via an email list.

Spring Gathering Flower Festival (30th Sept – 2 Oct): The committee (Marion Nelson, Judy Wiseman, Marney Moody, Betty Wakka, Angela Turner and myself) were very happy with this event, reviving the tradition



of a flower festival. Attendance was quiet with driving hail and gale force winds snapping the tea marquee in half! Hardy visitors, however, were delighted by the magnificent arrangements and moved by the chance to make their own posy in a jar and find a special place for it. Thanks to Kylie Moody (Marney and Ray's grand-daughter) and Rob Castiglione for taking wonderful photos.

Airing of the Quilts at St Georges: This was held on the same stormy weekend as the Spring Gathering. Alison Kenworthy liaised with the Walpole Ladies Art & Craft Group to hang a gloriously colourful collection of quilts which were blessed by Revd. Sue. Despite fallen trees and a power cut, the organisers persisted and gathered sociably around a primus stove.

On Sunday morning, each congregation celebrated creation and the gentle arts of flower arrangement and sewing. As Alison and I wrote in a blog for the Scattered People of the Good Shepherd, both were beautiful and successful community events despite the flight of Spring from the Spring Gathering and there being too much air in the Airing of the Quilts, and it is hoped to build on them next year ... perhaps a little later in the season! Living Testament: Although not counted in my work hours, it is worth mentioning that I was one of 70 women (and one of only two, as far as I know, from a church) lending my voice to the Living Testament project directed by Silvia Lehmann and Linda Bradbury. I was assisted a smaller group with the draft script, and was delighted to see how powerfully the directors brought together original music, words, personal stories and art-work focused on the Biblical stories of Tamar, Rahab, Ruth, Naomi and Bathsheba.

Mustard Seed Lunch: I coordinated volunteers and liaised with Tine Adams (who has undertaken the lion's share of the cooking in the last few years) for the MS Christmas lunch. This annual event is a festive opportunity for the parish to express its thanks for the enormous contribution of those who give their time and energy to the Mustard Seed Op Shop.

Liturgical

Sermons: I alternate preaching with Revd. Rodger Bull on the second Sunday of each month. We also shared the preaching roster when Sue went on long service leave last year.

Prayers: Some years ago, I commenced writing Prayers of the People which I now share with a growing number of parishes (including Revd. Karen Urquhart's in British Columbia!) In November, I ran a workshop for those leading intercessions as part of the worship series organised by Revd. Sue.

Extended Communion: I continue to share the Saturday morning service at the Blue Wren Lodge with Sue, Sally and Jan on a voluntary basis, and have extended communion on a few other occasions.

Twilight Meditations: For the past six years Revd. Sue and I have held a monthly meditation service. I currently prepare and promote most of these. During 2016 we built a core group to lead chanting which has replaced recorded music and deepened the meditational experience. This was initiated by a couple - Robert and Elise -who have now sadly returned to the eastern states and is sustained by Victoria Castiglione's leadership, as well as enjoyable social occasions. It is good to be able to invite those on the fringe of the parish to this service which, with further promotion, has the potential to grow.

Festival of Voice: Revd. Sue and I spent several months liaising with singers and musicians in the lead up to the June festival. The Sunday morning service was full, and it was profoundly moving to worship alongside the Central Desert Aboriginal Women's Choir. The church was also full for a magical Vespers service involving guest singers Molly Black and Lucy Ridsdale.

All Souls: As in the past two years, our riverside service has coincided with the Brave New Works community arts festival. I liaised with Denmark Arts to include the service in the program, and with the Denmark Dragon Boat Club who scattered petals as they glided past.

Christmas Services: Revd. Sue and I revised the Family Nativity and I had a wonderful time raiding the Mustard Seed for costumes and sewing up shepherd's cloaks and sheep ears etc. It was a lively service with about 70 attending. It was encouraging that so many local families responded to a direct invitation. I also assisted Sue in revising Lessons and Carols and coordinating readers.

Funeral: In August, I led a funeral service for the first time (Revd. Sue being absent) — a most rewarding experience involving Eklektika Community Choir. I was grateful for guidance by Revd. Rodger and the moral and musical support of Carolyn and Sally.

Administrative

Clearing: Several days have been dedicated to clearing out the vestry and small office

Parish Roll: Sally and I revised the form to facilitate an up to date directory. I have relieved the parish secretary of the task of updating the roll and am redesigning the resulting spreadsheet.

Roster: I relieved the Parish Secretary of this bi-annual task, which is also an opportunity to encourage participation in parish life.

Website: Harold Luxton undertook the important task of creating our parish website and has been updating it for many years. I am now looking at ways to build upon this and relieve the maintenance load.

Hall Project: I am assisting Revd. Sue in gathering information concerning a possible grants for this project, and will be working with others on fundraising initiatives.

Conclusion

The past nine months have been very full, and there is a constant stream of things that need to be done or could be done, but I am ever grateful that all our busyness as a community takes place against the constant revolution of sacred seasons and is grounded in the deepest peace.



This year we followed the MU theme of **All Over the World**.

ASYNODICAL TRADITION

In the earliest days of Christianity, Christian people gathered together in order to try and identify God's will for them as individuals and as a community of people. Those early assemblies became an important part of the heritage of Christianity. The Synods of the Modern Anglican church derive from that tradition. They represent the belief of the early Christians that God gave gifts to each and that God's spirit guided the whole community. So the whole church was to meet together to seek God's will. In modern times that has happened by Synods which have been made up of representatives of the wider church.

Coming together of God's people

In Anglicanism there is a strong tradition of authority to decide, belonging to the whole church. That is why lay and ordained are both included.

The Synod is a way for us to come together as a group of Anglican Christians to share the concerns that we have about our Christian faith and practice and to discern God's will for us as a Christian community.

This sharing takes place through common worship, legislative processes, considering motions, information sessions and informal fellowship.

THE FIVE MARKS OF MISSION

The Five Marks of Mission are an important statement on mission which expresses the Anglican Communion's common commitment to, and understanding of, God's holistic/integral mission.

- 1. To proclaim the good news of the Kingdom (TELL)
- 2. To teach, baptise and nurture new believers (TEACH)
- 3. To respond to human need by loving service (TEND)
- To seek to transform unjust structures of society, to challenge violence of every kind and to pursue peace and reconciliation (TRANSFORM)
- 5. To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation, and sustain and renew the life of the earth (TREASURE)
